Builder of the Family

*"If the Lord does not build the house,
in vain do its builders labour."*

- Psalm 127:1

Noah was asked to build an ark. The people of ancient time built the Tower of Babylon; and King Solomon was given to build a Temple for God. All of us too, are called to build on something - our many dreams of all things lovely, ideal and perfect.

In the bigger plan of God for humanity, St. Joseph was tasked to build not just to house personality, but also to house an indwelling presence of the God made man. Shortly after Jesus was born, the family of three fled into Egypt. While there, they were constantly on the run as Herod sent his forces out to hunt them down relentlessly.

A decade ago, I had the happy privilege of taking a group on a pilgrimage to Egypt. There we came face to face with the

marked out routes of the Holy Family's escapade. In a vision given to a Bishop of that locality sometime in the 4th Century, the path and the places they took refuge in, were noted down and these had become religious sites with churches built on them. Embarking on the foot trails, we prayed for the graces to enter into each of their spiritual journey.

The Holy Family's journey was fraught with lots of uncertainties, hunger, thirst and fatigue. There were occasions of surprised bounce of a near catch situation just within metres, dangerous stares by secret society, and even the little that they had, was stolen and thankfully, was given back to them. The family man, St. Joseph, had to make do with open space living for a day or two since they could not remain in a place for long. While on the lookout and on the run, the experience of living under one roof was unheard of. As Palestinian folks, they were easily spotted on among the Egyptians whose customs and cultures were foreign though not alienated altogether.

In retrospect, the family unit preceded the housing unit. God, using these events pre-ordained that such would be the given norms of the Holy Family model. The carpenter he had been would have to learn how to build first the family in order to better build the house. Providentially, it pointed thus this way for the Holy Family in both its vision and mission.



Called to be the architect of God's only blue print of building proper family unit, the wise man Joseph's given exodus in Egypt helped forge a family character the way God desired. Where the family grows and nurtures best in a deepening process of the ups and downs of its struggle, it shapes the family ethos and strengthens further the bond that is good and godly. The tribulations the Holy Family went through in their sojourn in Egypt engendered the potential of which the good in the family calls much to be desired and safeguarded.

Theology of the Body

What is Theology of the Body

The Theology of the Body is based on a series of 129 general audience addresses given by John Paul II when he was Pope between September 1979 and November 1984. In these series of talks, he provides a reflection on the human person through an analysis of biblical passages covering topics on sex and sexuality, creation, redemption, eternal life, marriage, celibacy and Christian morality. This short summary will focus largely on John Paul II's approach to sex and sexuality.

Why a Theology of the Body

The Holy Father posits that the human body possesses a "language" which allows it to make visible the eternal plan and mystery of God. "The body, in fact, and it alone, is capable of making visible what is invisible: the spiritual and divine. It was created to transfer in the visible reality of the world the invisible mystery hidden since time immemorial in God, and thus be a sign of it." What this means is that man images God in the unifying complementarity of male and female. As John Paul II explains, God is in Himself a life-giving communion of persons - Father, Son and Holy Spirit. In the one flesh union, man images God through the life-giving communion of persons. A "communion of persons" occurs when two people freely give themselves to each other and accept one another in love. The marital embrace or conjugal union is thus an icon of the inner life of the Trinity - the eternal exchange of love between the Father and the Son and manifested through the Spirit.

The spousal meaning of the body

We cannot understand human existence if we do not understand the reality of "gift". God initiates the gift and creates man to receive the gift, which is God's divine life and love. Man is created as a person first to receive the gift of God's gratuitous love and then to recapitulate that love by being gift to others.

Man and woman are persons made for each other and this is revealed in the body - the complementary differences of their bodies. The pope calls this the spousal meaning of the body which is "the body's capacity to express love: that love precisely in which the person becomes a gift and - by means of this gift - fulfils the very meaning of his being and existence." For it is the body that reveals (makes visible) the call to self-giving love. It is the body that reveals the mystery of "gift".

Significance of Being Called to Serve as a Member of the EMHC

Holy Communion or the host of the Body and Blood of Jesus is so sacred that only the Bishop, the Priest and the Deacon, who are by reason of their sacred Ordination, be the ordinary ministers of Holy Communion. "Ordinary" refers to the norm or what is allowed. The most common situation when Extraordinary Ministers of Holy Communion (EMHC) are required are when the number of faithful coming to receive Communion is so great that the celebration of Mass would be unduly prolonged.

If there is a sufficient number of "Ordinary Ministers", EMHC should not to be used. (cf. Redemptionis Sacramentum 154, 157, 158). Therefore, "Extraordinary" refers to the situation not the person.... but what a privilege when the occasion arises.

The Mass is the source and summit of our Catholic life and the Holy Communion is the climax of the celebration. A distinct feature of our Holy Mass is the use of signs and symbols which help us to perceive what we cannot see. As a member of the EMHC, I am given a special privilege to participate more actively in the Mass.

Privilege not in the sense of doing but through the signs to participate more consciously and thus avail ourselves more fruitfully to the graces offered in this awesome mystery of Christ in the Eucharist and God's covenantal love for His people.






33 Days to Morning Glory Retreat
